Message from the Board

Vocational Service Month

Last week in Tina's note on Vocational Service she noted that this Avenue of Service focuses on:

- ✓ Adherence to, and promotion of, the highest ethical standards in all occupations, including fair treatment of employers, employees, associates, competitors and the public.
- ✓ The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, not just your own or those pursued by Rotarians,
- ✓ The contribution of your vocational talents in solving the problems of society and meeting the needs of your community.

This week I'd like to hone in on the third of these issues and talk a little about three projects that we would like the club to adopt and support.

The projects are:

- ✓ The creation of internship partnership between Kaimuki High School and Metro Rotary,
- ✓ Along with the New Generations Committee, organizing workplace visits for school groups, and
- ✓ As mentioned by Major Charles Anthony of the Hawaii National Guard when he spoke a couple of weeks ago, the mentorship program run for at-risk youth at the Hawaii Youth ChalleNGe Academy.

The first project, which we would like to get underway at the beginning on 2007, is for Metro Rotary members to provide internship opportunities for students from Kaimuki High School. The internships will be for a lapsed time of 24 hours, with start and end dates and session times agreed between the school and the employer.

The aim is to provide students with a real work experience while allowing employers to build alliances with schools and teachers... and who knows, you might find a really great future employee interns with you. Anyone interested in finding out more about becoming a mentor should contact me at kpops@hawaii.rr.com or Billie Lueder at kAIMUKH/HIDOE@notes.k12.hi.us. We'll be putting out a handout and application form for the project in a couple of weeks.

The second project is to open your workplace to a small group of student from various schools to let them have the opportunity to see how a business works. Visits will be no longer than a couple of hours (probably less) and will require that you have someone available to show the students round, explain what is going on and answer questions. Again, think of it as an investment in the state's future.

The last project is targeted at individual Rotarians rather than their businesses and employers. Major Anthony told us about the National Guard Youth ChalleNGe Program that intervenes in the lives of at-risk youth, producing graduates with the values, skills, education and self-disciple necessary to succeed as adults. The program, which runs nationwide, has been a spectacular success. Where we can help is by providing one-on-one mentors for Hawaii participants. You can find out more about the program at www.ngycp.org/state/hi. Mentors need to commit for a specific duration but meeting frequency and time are between the mentor and student. If you are interested let me know and I'll pass your details on to Major Charles – you can contact him directly but I would like to see this as a Metro Rotary project and see how much resource we can put into it.

Vocational Service is a prime way of involving Rotary in the community and helping the community become a better place in the future. Please support our projects.



ECLUB ONE HOW TO MAKE UP



- Read a variety of current articles in our Programs section and/or choose articles from our Archived Programs list and/or information from our Avenues of Service pages. You will be required to answer questions. There is space on the makeup request form for up to three articles to be reviewed, however you will need to read more than three to meet your 30 minute visit obligation.
- At the end of your 30 minute visit click on Make-up Request Form from the drop-down menu at top of page OR the bottom of each make-up program.
- Read Makeup Request Form carefully, and follow instructions. A Make-Up Form will appear once you press the SUBMIT button (one time only) and an email copy will be sent to the email address you provided.

 PRINT YOUR MAKE-UP FORM

Once your make-up appears, if you know the email address, you can also click on File, Send and email a copy to your club secretary.

From eClub One Webmaster...

It is a mandatory requirement that Rotarians spend at least 30 minutes on the Rotary eClub One website to qualify for a make-up credit. Please use your 30 minute visit to review a variety of articles from our Programs section and/or information from our Avenues of Service pages. As always, Rotarians should apply the 4-Way Test to the time they spend on the eClub One site for a make-up.






