Meet John Lezak



Welcome to **John F. Lezak**, who joined Metro Rotary in October 2006 and was sponsored by Gloria Chang. John, who is a member of the Hawaii State and American Bar Associations, has been a partner in the firm Kobayashi, Sugita & Goda since 1996.

After practicing briefly in New York following his admission to the New York Bar in 1969, John moved to Hawaii and practiced with Padgett, Greeley, Marumoto & Akinaka from 1970 to 1975. In 1975, he practiced at Carlsmith, where he continued his emphasis in real estate and related financing, commercial, and business law. He was a senior partner in the real estate section of the Carlsmith firm before leaving in 1986 to join in forming the firm of Bays, Deaver, Hiatt, Kawachika and Lezak as a partner. He remained with the firm for a decade.

John graduated from the University of Chicago with a Bachelor of Arts and then earned a Masters of Arts from Harvard University. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School. He has received the highest "AV" rating from Martindale-Hubbell. Donate your old computer

Q. If I want to recycle an old computer, can I still? What about a monitor? It seems a shame to throw them away.

A. Yes, there are programs.

Hawai'i Computers for Kids has been helping recycle computers and get them to Hawai'i schools — kindergarten through high school — and nonprofit organizations that need them, for more than 15 years.

### Thank you, Ken Goldstein!

Ken Goldstein is the founder and state director of the program. His Rotary club, the Rotary Club of Metropolitan Honolulu, and its 130 members support and sponsor the program as their signature project.

Goldstein's program accepts Pentium III/4 and Celeron computers, as well as Macintosh G3s & faster. "We can also take working 17-inch monitors with each of those computers; along with printers, scanners and other devices connecting via USE or FireWire; and software and supplies," he said.

Anyone who has donations that match the organization's needs can call 521-2259 or e-mail Goldstein with a list at cfk@catii.com. Include contact information and an address where donations can be picked up. He will contact schools and nonprofit agencies and have one get in touch to arrange for a mutually convenient pickup.

"I will then be glad to e-mail them with a tax receipt after donations have been claimed," Goldstein said.

"I have approximately 1,600 volunteers around the state who keep an eye out for donations, assist with transportation and logistics, and otherwise help me keep things rolling. Our longevity is likely due to the fact that we've never accepted one penny for donations or services."

Hawaii Computers for Kids directly supports Hawai'i K-12 schools and nonprofit organizations statewide at no cost, he said

"My biggest problem over the past 15 years is finding schools and nonprofits smart enough to pick up the phone and ask for the free stuff we receive," he said.

#### Dear Metro Rotarians:

"Hawaii Calls"...the theme of the recent Rotary Club of Metropolitan Honolulu gala fundraiser. More importantly, when Hawaii's most needy call, dedicated Rotarians can often be counted on to answer.

This certainly has been our experience at the Youth Outreach Project, affectionately called YO! Members of Metro Rotary volunteered their time, resources, and ingenuity to provide a much needed face lift to our 1940's era Waikiki cottage. YO! is a safe haven for kids who otherwise have to call the streets of Waikiki home. Metro Rotarians transformed our dilapidated youth drop-in center into a more efficient and functional facility.

Metro Rotarians exemplify the meaning of community service by having made a real difference in the lives of some of Hawaii's most needy youth. The work and renovations performed by the members impact the YO! clients on a daily basis. Pouring concrete to construct a concrete handicap ramp, a sidewalk for wheel chair access to the laundry facilities, and a new driveway was a monumental endeavor that the Metro Rotary met head on. Re-erecting the chain link fence also added a few square feet to a backyard that was beautified a bit thanks to weeding and new plantings. That project turned out absolutely terrific and will benefit YO! clients for years to come.

Imagine desperately needing to use the bathroom as someone lingers in the shower, keeping the only bathroom occupied for what seem like endless minutes. This was a frequent occurrence at YO!, that is until the Metro Rotarians arrived. Rotarians used their ingenuity to redesign the YO! bathroom and install a dividing wall between the shower and the rest of the bathroom. For the first time in YO!'s 17 year history, clients no longer need to do the "shi shi" dance as they wait for someone to finish washing off the grime of the streets. The "mastermind" behind the bathroom redesign says it was an "obvious" solution, but we would have continued doing the shi shi dance for years if not for the Metro Rotary. YO! clients are now dancing with jubilation.

As many of you know, the work did not end with the concrete and the bathroom. The computers that were installed are now up and running and the kids use them all the time. The computers have become one of the lures that draws the kids off the streets and in to YO, and also provide a healthy and positive alternative to the streets. Of course most are emailing their friends and family or perusing MySpace, but a few of the clients have written resumes and conducted internet job searches. We hope that in time more will enhance their computer skills for things like writing resumes and conducting research as well as creating music, art, and videos. As stated by one YO client, "the computers are a blessing."

The Rotary's "adoption" of YO! culminated at the annual fundraiser. The gala event provided one YO! client by the name of Mike with an opportunity to share his past challenges and current successes. Mike was very nervous as he took the stage, but stood in the spot light and provided an inspirational presentation of his story. He shared much of his history including homelessness, drug addiction, and mental illness. Mike has effectively transitioned from a life on the street, to an independent and healthy standard of living. Mike shared that he would not have been able to rise above this adversity without the assistance provided by YO! Mike is just one example of individuals and organizations working together with the mission of making positive changes in the community.

YO! is truly fortunate to have been adopted by an outstanding organization like Metro Rotary. Each member can be certain that they will have a share of every success that the YO! clients experience over the years. YO! applauds all you've done and calls out our sincere appreciation to the Rotary Club of Metropolitan Honolulu.


