A CRIMEFIGHTER WHO CARES ABOUT PEOPLE

Matt Levi accomplishes amazing things in the messy world of crime. After a career in television beginning in 1973 where his duties included reporting on crime and politics, Levi decided to leave television behind and open his own business, a private detective agency. It employs 5 people. He followed that with opening a security company in which he employs approximately 200 people. Seven years after he left the world of television, Rick Blangiardi, General Manager of KGMB and KHNL, asked him if he would do some local news specials, which resulted in the feature, "Matt Levi Investigates".

As a private detective, Levi and his employees are hired to check out worker's compensation cases which are suspected to be fraudulent, do background interviews, and locate and interview witnesses. His security firm provides guards for many businesses and they also do postal security.

But that is not all Levi does. He works with the Juvenile Court system. There he is a "gentle" giant. Levi is a martial arts expert. He has a program in which he teaches at-risk youth the martial arts, with an emphasis on proper behavior, discipline, and problem solving without fighting. The Juvenile Court refers youngsters to him. He has worked out an agreement with private schools to provide tuition-free scholarships to some of the youngsters. There are currently about 32 of his students in private schools, 21 of whom are on their school's honor roll.

Levi also spoke of his family. He was adopted by a Jewish couple who fled the Holocaust. He has a tremendous amount of love and respect for his late parents. His father was the recipient of two Fulbright scholarships and was a UH professor. In addition to Matt, he and his wife adopted a girl. Levi and his sister, who are not related, often wonder what would have happened to them if they had not been adopted by such a wonderful couple.

Levi is married to "a beautiful Kamehameha graduate" and they have 3 daughters. The oldest fulfilled her dream of becoming a cheerleader for the Dallas Cowboys football team. Another is a cheerleader for the Washington Huskies. The youngest and her husband manage a hotel and restaurant in Mexico. They have blessed Matt and his wife with 3 grandchildren.

Levi mentioned the drug problem which is the major cause of the lengthy trail of youngsters ending up in Juvenile Court. They come from dysfunctional families, many as a result of drug use by the parents. (That drug problem will be the subject at our June meeting when DEA agent Callery will speak to us.)

In spite of the factions of life with which Levi is involved, he comes across as a most personable fellow. He speaks with a quiet humor and his empathy for the youngsters from dysfunctional families is evident. It is wonderful that at least some of the at-risk children get an opportunity to learn with his guidance. It is unfortunate he can't be cloned so even more youngsters could receive such help.


Our second General Membership Meeting of the year was another success with over 40 members and guests present. Pictured as listed:

WHEN STEWARDESSES GET TOGETHER

While having lunch with a friend recently, I was amused when she related a story told by one of her friends. It was during the days of TITA. as the company referred to "Theater in the Air", when we sold headsets to economy passengers interested in viewing the film. The friend was selling on one aisle of the 747 and noticed the stewardess on the other aisle, an Asian lady, seemed to be making more sales than she was. She stopped for a moment to watch and heard the stewardess mispronouncing the one-word title of the movie, turning it into a word more often associated with pornography.

It reminded me of other humorous instances involving passengers who did not speak English. One such incident was on a 707 flight I was working from Guam to Tokyo. In those days, Guam had become a favorite warm vacation spot for the Japanese because of its shorter flight duration than Honolulu. As I walked down the aisle toward the back of the aircraft, I was stopped by a Japanese man who was about to ask me a question when the man beside him elbowed him in the ribs and pointed up the aisle behind me. Both the aisle passenger and I looked to see what the man had pointed to. It was another stewardess, Elizabeth Matsushino, by name. I realized they felt they would have better luck asking questions of her. However, I knew that Elizabeth spoke fluent German and nary a word of Japanese. So I continued on, but just a couple of steps so I was behind the row of 3 Japanese men. Sure enough, they stopped her and asked what the weather was like at our destination. Elizabeth said, "Huh?" and I stepped forward and said, "Takusan ame ga furimasu." (It's raining heavily.) The men looked at me and at her and started laughing. We joined in.

In another instance, during the boarding process, I proceeded to the aft section to check on something with the other purser. As I passed a young stewardess of Japanese background in the aisle, I heard a passenger ask her for a "zasshi". She was obviously puzzled so I whispered, "He wants a magazine." I continued on. Later, in flight, she asked me how I knew what he was saying. She added that she thought the word was "Magazino". She was born and raised on the mainland.

I relate these stories because I know many of our readers, besides flight attendants, dealt with passengers who did not speak English. Employees who worked in the airport area could probably top the above stories because they encountered non-English speaking passengers when they were in a more stressful situation, i.e. trying to make their way through check-in and find their way to

the correct departure area. Think back and send me your amusing or frustrating encounters. All stories are welcome. I also accept your stories of being in a foreign location and trying to communicate with people who could not speak your language.


